### "Averse To Sports" . . . . .

Other sports writers have doused cold water on the centennial committee's efforts. It seems a complete history of Doubleday's life in the files of the War Department fails to mention any connection between him and baseball. In a full Pennsylvania at Philadelphia, account of his life, military career, hobbies and habits, the only reference to sports in any form or fashion reads:

'He was rather averse to outdoor sports and was retiring in his manner."

This has been called the most accurate description of Doubleday existing. Later in the account it read:


