

Demonstration On Control of Peach Pepsi-Cola Will Tree Borers Given Sponsor Program

the dirt from around the tree and using a knife or a nail to dig the worm out the tree. It was later discovered that paradishlorobenzine applied around the trees would kill the peach tree borers. However, this mixture had to be taken away from the tree within five or six weeks to prevent injury.

It has now been discovered that ethylene dichloride emulison is almost any time of the year. After solution is made up, about one pint is poured around the roots of the tree, and a little dirt is applied on top to help hold the fumes in the ground. That is all the work that is necessary.

Although ethylene dichloride emulsion may be applied at any time of the year, as stated above, the best time to treat the trees is perhaps in the fall of the year.




