

The original office hours observed were 1 o'clock to 4:30 Wednesday afternoons, and 8:30 a. m. to 12 Saturday mornings. These hours will continue to be kept for 6 o'clock. office work and for vaccinations,

in addition to Friday afternoons. The increase in diphtheria vaccinatons has resulted from enactment of a state law, requiring that all infants between months and six years be given the toxoid. While there were 40 toxoid doses given in February, there were 108 administered in March, and 138 in April.
