Funeral Services To Be Conducted Today at the Home At 11:00 A. M.

George W. Thomas, 69, prominent business man and native of Person county, died Tuesday afternoon at 6:15 in Community hospital, following a heart attack that occurred a few minutes earlier in his store, the Thomas Hardware company. Mr. Thomas had returned recently from a hospital in Durham, but before his fatal attack, was thought to be recuperating nicely.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home this morning at 11 o'clock, with the Rev. W. C. Martin in charge, assisted by Rev. Al Martin and Rev. W. F. West. Interment will follow im mediately in Burchwood ceme




