Formal announcements of the early August marriage of their daughter, Miss Mary Shuford Carlton, to Massey Leonard Printz, of Washington, D. C., were issued this week by Mr. and Mrs. Luther Montrose Carlton, prominent Roxboro residents.

News of the marriage, which was solemnized in Bethlehem Chapel, Washington Cathedral, Washington, D. C., at 4:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, August 3, by the Rev. Dr. Theodore O. Wedel, Canon Chancellor of Washington, will be received with interest throughout North Carolina and Virginia, where the bride and bridegroom and members of their respective families are well known.

For the simple but impressive ceremony altar decorations of Ascension lilies were used, and the bride and bridegroom, who entered the Chapel together, were proceeded by the Rev. Dr. Wedel and by Edward L. Marr, Verger of the Cathedral.
