orning unless those served upn come to the office for treatments, before that time, are three Negroes, two men and one woman, William Bumpass, of Rox poro, Nathaniel Brooks, of the Bethel Hill road, and Ruth Crowder, of Ceffo. In commenting on he issuance of warrants, Dr. Allen said that the Bird woman is the first white person who has had to be threatened with punishment for failure to comply with the regulations governing

He also said that those persons ipon whom the warrants are served will if arrested be confined to the Person County jail, as room provided, for a period of three weeks or more until they have been rendered non-infectious. Dr. Allen said that in addition to those mentioned a number other residents may be liable to arrest unless they comply, Within the year several such arrests have been made and Dr. Allen all persons expected to comply should do so.
