Completion of the three-story education unit marks the ending of first stage of the building program undertaken by Baptists of this city, who plan at a later date to complement the education building with a church edifice done in the same brick Colonial design. Work on the education building, under the supervision of Bert Miller, foreman of the George W. Kang construction company, of this city, was begun late last spring and has since then gone forward with slight interruption.


