"Ace" at Duke

Durham, Feb. 13.—Clarence (Ace) Parker, All-America football player at Duke in 1936, arrived last week to serve in the capacity as "visiting" coach and will assist with back-field candidates during Duke's off-season football drills.

Parker, who last Fall was voted the most valuable player in the National Professional Football League for his play with the Brooklyn Dodgers, will be here for the duration of the Duke drills.

In regard to his playing baseball with Portsmouth of the Piedmont League, Parker said, "I left Portsmouth before the Pittsburgh team returned my contract to the Chicago Cubs, and I know nothing about it. I haven't signed to play baseball with anyone, but I have talked with Frank Lawrence, owner of the Portsmouth team. I also talked with Larry MacPhail of the Brooklyn Dodgers. I do want to play baseball with some team."

It is reported that the Dodgers may send Ace to Montreal of the International League and let Ace play until he has to report for football practice August 15.

Ace last summer played with Syracuse of the INT loop and was leading the league in hitting when he sustained a broken leg.

He Will Help The Devils

Our personal opinion is that Parker will be a great help to the Blue Devils in their spring drills. He knows quite a bit about football and there is no other team that he would rather pass his knowledge to than the Blue Devils of Duke.

Historic Stage Coach Inn Goes Back To 1859

A California landmark bear-
ing the date 1859, makes its screen
debut in "Come Live with Me,"
co-starring James Stewart and
Hedy Lamarr and showing at
the Palace Theatre Monday and
Tuesday.

The landmark is an ancient
Stage Coach Inn, erected on Ven-
tura Boulevard during the days
of the early West and the padres.
Originally a spot where the stage
riders could change horses and
the padres could stop on their
travels, the Inn now dispenses
fried chicken and 85c dinners,
but in spite of this fact it is
steeped in history and around
its walls hang many relics of the
early days of California.

"Come Live with Me" is the
first film to co-star Stewart and
Miss Lamarr, and is the story of
a beautiful Austrian refugee who
marries a penniless young author
in an effort to obtain a quota
number and remain in the United
States.

\$175,000,000 VOTED FOR ARMY LOW CLOTHING BY SENATE

Washington, Feb.—The Senate
passed and sent to the White
House a \$175,000,000 appropria-
tion for Army clothing and equip-
ment.

Army officials had asked for
the funds at this time instead of
as a part of the next regular ap-
propriation measure in order to
place orders in "off seasons" in-
stead of buying in the summer
and fall when commercial buy-
ing is expected to be heavy. . . .
The new clothing and equip-
ment will be needed, officials
said, for the expansion of the Ar-
my to an expected 1,400,000 men.

IRONCLAD MONITOR NEARS END OF DAYS AS A FERRY

New Orleans, Feb.—One of the

CORN

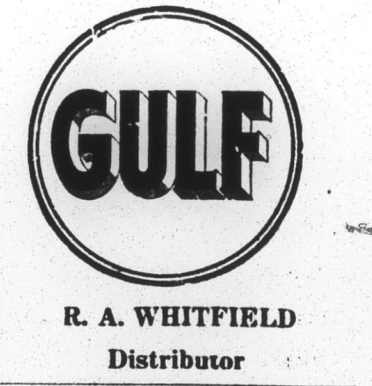
Corn accounted for more than
