

Where a market for milk is not available, either sweet or sour cream may be sold to creameries. If sold in this manner, the butterfat is worth 30 cents a pound or \$69.50 annually. To this must be added the value of the skim milk left on the farm for use as calf, chicken and pig feed. Valuing this at \$25 and adding the \$20 worth of manure would mean a total income of \$114.60 from the cow where crea mis sold instead of milk.


