Prize Winners Named For Bass Contest

Prize winners in Western Auto's fifth nation-wide Big Bass Fishing Contest have just been announced by the Western Auto Supply Company, which annually conducts the contest in 38 states east of the Rocky Mountains in which are located Western Auto Stores and Western Auto Associate Stores. The contest closed September 30.

In an effort to increase public interest in the sport of fishing, Western Auto each year offers several groups of valuable prizes for the largest black bass registered in each of the states covered by the contest. First prize, C. F. Barnard, Greensboro, large mouth, 9 lbs., 5 oz.; Second prize, Lonnie Chance, Rockingham; large mouth, 8 lbs., 8 oz.; Third prize, O. T. Cole, Raleigh, large mouth, 8 lbs., 4 oz.; Fourth prize, Ben Rivers, Wadesboro, large mouth, 8 lbs., 4 oz.; Fifth prize, Granklin Bishop, Spartanburg, S. C., large mouth, 8 lb., 2 oz.; Trophy winner, Sgt. T. R. Lewis, Fort Bragg, small mouth, 5 lbs., 10 oz.

In most instances these prizes are being presented to the winners personally by the Western Auto Store or the Western Auto Associate Store in which the contestant originally registered.

The 1941 contest, according to the Western Auto Supply Company, was far more popular than previous contests—hundreds of large bass being entered by fishermen all over the country. The largest bass reported was from Florida and weighed 14 lbs. 12 ozs. The smallest prize winner entry was registered in Vermont and weighed two pounds. Prize winners included men,
