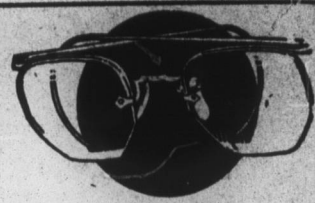

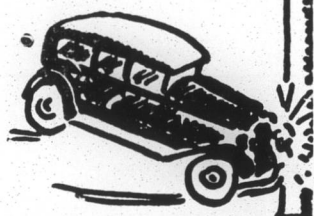
PLENTY OF GARDEN SEED ON HAND
