Driver License Examinations To Be Conducted

Raleigh, June 3.—Driver License Examiners throughout the State will accept applications for renewal of chauffeur's licenses for 1943-'44, beginning June 1, Ronald Hocutt, Director of the Highway Safety Division, announced today.

All North Carolina chauffeur's licenses are issued for one year and expire at Midnight June 30, 1943. Therefore, it is urged by the Director that applications be made prior to that date to avoid possible delay in truck and bus operations in the present emergency.

A change in the Driver's License Act by the 1943 legislature eliminates the requirement for chauffeur's badge. Therefore, chauffeurs for 1943-'44 will be issued only the license.

The law requires all applicants for chauffeurs license, who carry public passengers to be twenty-one (21) years old; and those who haul public property to be eighteen (18) years old.

The fee for chauffeurs license is two dollars (\$2.00).

Held Monday from the late residence on North Main street were final rites for Percy Bloxam, 55, City Manager of Roxboro, whose death occurred Saturday morning at his home here after a heart attack.

Services were in charge of the Rev. Rufus J. Womble, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, of which he was an active member and vestryman, and interment followed in Burchwood cemetery here.

In addition to his wife, daughter and two sons, survivors include two daughters-in-law, Mrs. Ian Bloxam, of Atlanta, and Mrs. Leonard Bloxam, of Spencer, both of whom attended the funeral. Other survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Bloxam, of Chesham, England, and a sister and brother, Mrs. Joyce Bloxam Dixon and Bernard Bloxam, both of England. Also here were Major and Mrs. A. R. Turnbull, of Norfolk, Va.,

and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Byford, of Elmwood, together with many friends from Masonic circles from out of the City.
