They were ordered to the rear to reorganize and were waiting near a railroad when the dive bombers came.

"An enemy barrage was laid down by dive bombers," he said. "My tank was hit just as we were going to drop back because the fighting was too hot. Continuous waves of three to five dive bombers kept coming over and about wiped out three companies of infantry tanks.

"The first two bombs landed a few feet from my tank. I started over the side, but the third bomb made a direct hit and

(Continued from front page) sixty-five, Public Laws of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, be amended by striking out Section one and inserting in lieu thereof the follow-

"Section 1. That every person using, operating, or driving a motor vehicle upon or over the roads or highways of the State of North Carolina, or upon or over any of the streets of any of the incorporated towns and cities of North Carolina, upon approaching from any direction cn the same highway any school bus transporting school children to or from school, while such bus is stopped and engaged in receiving cr discharging passengers therefrom upon the roads or highways of the State or upon any of the streets of any of the incorporated towns and cities of the State, shall bring such mctor vehicle to a full stop before passing or attempting to pass such Does Your Well Go Dry, Have bus and shall remain stopped unone drilled; you can depend on til said passengers are received it.
