
These incenerating plants consist of three units each. In addition, each plant has a sterilizer and a tank of hot water, heated by the incinerators. Every refuse can -- familiarly known as G. I. can — that is emptied promptly sterilized and washed before it goes back to its mess hall or barracks. This, in itself, is an important sanitation measure, and an aid to insect control.


