W. N. C. Sanatorium Open

The Western North Carolina Sanatorium was opened for the receiving of patients on November 7, 1937. The cost of the entire Hospital unit was approximately \$1,000,000.

The original idea of a State Sanatorium in the western part of North Carolina was that of Mr. E. A. Raspberry of Snow Hill, N. C., for whom one wing of the Sanatorium is named. His idea was accelerated into positive motion by the ingenuity of both Mr. Raspberry and Mr. L. L. Gravelly of Rocky Mount, N. C., present Chairman of the Board of Directors, and for whom another wing of the Sanatorium is named. Also, Dr. P. P. McCain, who is general superintendent for all state sanatoriums, gave impetus to the idea and worked tirelessly to see that it became a reality.

Those who labored so unselfishly through the first morning hours of the Sanatorium's life may now recall many happy incidents, as well as some unpleasant complications, but their main purpose was the restoration of health to those who were sick and they never lost sight of their goal. To Dr. S. M. Bittinger, who first served in the capacity of Medical Director, but who is now Associate Superintendent of all state sanatoria as well, credit is given for the successful operation of the Sanatorium through its infancy, but especially during the war years when each day brought new problems of help shortage. Assisting Dr. Bittinger from 1937 when the Sanatorium was opened and until he resigned to enter private practice in Hickory, N. C., was Dr. Allison L. Ormond.

The total number of employees for the entire institution at the present time is 189. The normal complement is 180.

The Sanatorium is supported largely by appropriations of the State Legislature. However, each patient is required to pay at least the minimal rate of \$10 per day, but in cases where they are better situated financially the rates are \$10 and \$150 per day, this being determined from information given by the patient or the financial position of the application blank. In such a case where the patient is unable to pay even the smallest charge, either the county from which he comes, or some charitable organization can be called upon for financial assistance, which has been very generously given in many instances.

CEILING ON APPLES IS ADVANCING

An advance of seven cents per bushel in the ceiling on apples has been granted North Carolina apple growers, the Office of Price Administration has notified the State Agriculture Department.

Marketing Specialist W. R. Scott has said the advance, which is now in effect, was made to compensate for the extremely low yields in this State.

For graded and packed apples grown in North Carolina, the ceiling for shipping points are as follows:

October, \$2.92; Nov. 1-6, \$4.02; Nov. 16-30, \$4.07; Dec. 1-15, \$5.00.

Lawrence (Buster) Burnette and wife are visiting with their parents. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Burnette of Black Mountain. Mrs. Burnette is the former Doris Fortune, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Fortune of Montreat.

Lawrence received his discharge from the Navy at Lido Beach Long Island, N. Y. He served 7 years and 8 months in the Navy. He was stationed on the U. S. S. Raleigh all during his naval career. He was at Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941. He served both in the Atlantic and Pacific.

Before he was discharged on the Point system, he held the rank of chief water tender.

The North Carolina Division of the U. D. C. and the Women's Medical Auxiliary give their support for one bed each, and the Lion's Club of Black Mountain also bears the expense for one patient. At various times in the past many individuals have contributed to the Sanatorium Hospital Fund, a fund which is realized from the profits of the Sanatorium Store, and which is used for general improvement around the hospital, and for indigent patients who find it most difficult to obtain even the bare necessities for a comfortable stay in the Sanatorium.

The Hospital capacity is 300, and it is equipped to treat white patients only. Since the institution was opened 2600 patients have been treated, and of this number approximately 45 to 50% have been rehabilitated. The Hospital conducts an out-patient clinic, and each year approximately 3,000 patients are examined in this clinic. Also, the reading of outside X-ray films constitutes a large part of the extension work, and in the past year 2,400 outside films were interpreted and reports sent out.

It is so arranged that all types of modern treatment for tuberculosis can be carried out at the Sanatorium, including major surgery, as surgery plays a very important part in the treatment of tuberculosis.

The Sanatorium is so equipped that the ambulatory patients and staff members can enjoy movies once weekly. The Moving Picture Exchange in Charlotte furnishes the films, and this is done without cost to the Sanatorium. Also, Sunday School and church services are provided, and these are conducted by the Pastors of the Black Mountain churches, alternately.

Located in the Administration building is the post office, which is a branch of the Black Mountain Post Office. Mrs. S. E. Lee is Postmaster. A large volume of out-going and in-coming mail is handled in this office.

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
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
