

Barringer, Hickory, and Mr. and Mrs. Troy White, Lenoir. Owned by Mr. and Mrs. D. P. is 150 years old, has eight slave houses still standing, and has been inherited from one generation to another. As Mr. Dellinger has no close relatives, he is the last of

his generation. Unique in the Barringer home is a folding stairs which fold or unfold at the press of a button. Mrs. White is the granddaughter of Thomas L. Stradley, who, desiring freedom of worship, came here from Sussex, England and founded the first Baptist religion

in North Carolina. Mr. White is a native of Black Mountain and a veteran of World War II.
