Need For Home Training Cited By **Guest Speaker**



While there are four or five per cent of the young people who may be considered to be serious problems for the probation officers or others in authority, the rest are either all right or need only proper guidance to help them over the rough spots, the visitor said. Of the factors which can mean most in the development of desirable childhood habits, the speaker listed the home, the church, and the school. If the parents would do their job well, there would be no need for juvenile courts, he concluded.
