Red Cross Serves **VA Hospitals On Volunteer Basis**

When Moore General hospital was taken over November 15 by the Veterans Administration as an annex to the hospital at Oteen, a new Red Cross service constituted a part of the change.

The American National Red Cross instituted service in veterans hospitals soon after the end of the World War II in an effort to assist the veterans administration by assigning a field director to the hospital to stimulate and coordinate the service of Red Cross volunteers serving the hospital. The field director acts as liasion between the hospital manager and Red Cross in matters pertaining to Red Cross services and supplies. She works closely with all departments to learn the needs of the patients so that she can interpret these needs and give the people in the local and surrounding communities an opportunity to serve these hospitalized veterans who have served our country and people so well. Miss Lola Crawford is the field director for this area.

The veterans administration suppiles the very best in the way of facilities, care, and treatment for the patients in their hospitals, but there are other things that contribute toward the healing of the whole man. The mental attitude or morale of a man determines how he will respond to treatment.

Through the services of volunteers Red Cross is paving the way for service to these veterans that will make them more content to face the long period of hospitalization that must be endured, that will raise their morale to the point where they will want to get well, and that will keep them in touch with the world outside the hospital to which they will return. When volunteers come into the hospital to give personal services, they bring a touch of home and family to the patient and also a contact with a world which is a happy contrast to his hospital world peopled with doctors and nurses, whom he sees every day.

This community has the opportunity and privilege of serving one of the largest veterans' hospitals probably be the largest tuberculosis hospital in the world. The patients in this hospital need your interest and assistance in fighting their battle for health. They need the Gray Ladies who will visit them, write letters, run necessary errands, send their telegrams and see that personal needs are answered. As no employee of the veterans administration is allowed to handle a patient's money, he is dependent upon his Gray Ledford, Mary Lemaster, Nancy Lady for everything that involves Lemaster, Ruth Meeks, Barbara the handling of his money. A shopping service must be set up since the majority of these patients will not be able to leave the hospital and shop for themselves. The patients need entertainment and diversion that can be brought to them from the community: talented individuals or groups who Margaret Stephenson, Hazel will come out and entertain, girls Strickland, Patsy Stroup, Pat who will act as hostesses at parties, people who would like to play games, and groups that would like to assist with parties.

There are even patients who want to make constructive use of the time they spend in the hospital by studying in an effort to complete their education that was interrupted by the war. The veterans administration is making this opportunity available but as personnel is limited in this field, volunteers are needed to assist the patients with their studies.

The cooperation of every citizen in the community and in surrounding communities will be needed to do the job that is before us.
