College Presents Distinguished Summer Faculty

Outstanding Educators Will Teach Here

Black Mountain College, famous among experimental enterprises in education, will feature in its summer session program, June 30 to August 23, a guest faculty of distinction in music, art, the humanities and science. Its 90 students (60 in summer) and 20 faculty members work together in a small community near Asheville, North Carolina, high in the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Erwin Bodky, pianist and harpsichordist, from the Longy School of Music, Cambridge, will conduct study in the development of keyboard music. Carol Brice of New York City, guest contralto with Serge Koussevitsky at the Berkshire Music Festival last season, will sing in recitals during part of of the summer session. Lino Bartoli, artist violin teacher of Baylor University, and formerly first violinist with the Pittsburgh Symphony, and Mrs. Bartoli, pianist, will give lecture recitals on the development of the piano-violin sonata and will lead string ensembles. Edward Lowinsky of the Black Mountain College faculty will direct choral ensembles, and Mrs. Lowinsky will teach violin. All of the artists will join in concerts, the rehearsals for which will be taken as a laboratory study for students.

Beaumont Newhall of the Museum of Modern Art, New York City, will teach and lecture in photography. Hya Bolotowsky, artist of New York City, member of the Black Mountain College faculty for the past year, will teach painting and drawing. Weaving will be taught by Trude Guermonprez, textile designer of Holland and consultant in weaving, and Franziska Mayer, formerly of the Grenfell Association,

Erich Kahler, historian and author of "Man the Measure." will leave the Institute of Advanced Study at Princeton during part of the summer to conduct seminars in World Government and the Crisis of the Individual.

Charles Bell of Princeton University will teach courses in English and the Humanities. Harold Sproul, Columbia University, will offer work in creative writing, and will join chamber music ensembles as a 'cellist. Frank Aydelotte Rice, linguist from the faculty of the College of the City of Charleston, South Carolina, will teach German language and literature.

Carl Clement, physicist, engaged in research on the cyclotron at the University of California, will teach in the fields of physics and history of science.
