

### Dividend To Be Paid By Farmers Federation

Directors of the Farmers Fed eration cooperative have declared the regular semi-annual dividend on common and preferred stock, payable July 1 to all stockholders of record June 14, 1947. This will be the twenty-seventh consecutive semi-annual dividend to be paid by the Farmers Federation, June 11, was elected and installed and it applies to all common and preferred stock.

There were 19,972 stockholders of record December 31, and according to James G. K. McClure, president, there has been a considerable increase in the number since that time. Business done through the retail stores for the year 1946 was \$4,575,346.36, Mr. McClure announced. This does not include the business of the Carolina and Farmers tobacco warehouses, or the other organizations

The Farmers Federation was organized to provide marketing facilities and services which will develop agricultural production in Western North Carolina. Beginning in a small way, it has developed markets for poultry, eggs, forest products, dairy products, vegetables, and handicraft articles. Mr. McClure added that \$3,-118,051.51 was paid to farmers in 1946 through the various markets of the Farmers Federation.

During the year 1946 the Farmers Federation hatchery distributed 1,424,125 baby chicks, and to date this year more chicks have been hatched than last year. All these chicks are from flocks which are carefully supervised to eradicate disease, and cockerels from high-producing strains head the supply flocks, so that the baby ried to Jack T.
