C. C. Head Points **Out Need For Advertising City**

Black Mountain and North Carolina face stiff competition in the years ahead in the tourist field as many other states and cities are making efforts to sell their particular part of the country, Charlie Spencer, president of the Black Mountain chamber of commerce told the 1948 directors at their regular meeting Monday night. Ten members were present.

"The only way to keep the folks coming is to keep telling them what we have here to offer," Mr. Spencer declared. "The time may not be too far in the future when we will be looking for tourists instead of wondering what we are going to do with the crowd." To stress the point that advertising pays, the president showed a large number of folders and booklets from states and cities scattered across the nation.

After much discussion the directors decided to print a booklet this year instead of folders. Five thousand of these booklets, all about Black Mountain and its attractions, will be published and be ready for distribution by April 1. In addition the members several weeks ago voted to sponsor at a cost of \$250.00 two pages in a magazine which will be printed within the near future.

Managers of rooming houses, hotels, and tourist courts, may list their facilities in the local booklet which will have a circulation of 5000. Those desiring further information should contact Charlie Spencer, Reed Hill, or the NEWS.
