Relief Parcels-

The following is quoted from the Postal Bulletin of June 29. 1948 in connection with relief par. cels to certain foreign countries;

"Effective July 6, 1948, and un. til further notice, the present postage rates on such relief parcels sent by surface means will be reduced by 4 cents per pound for the following countries only: Austria, Belgium, China, France, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Greece, Italy, Luxemburg, Netherlands, and the zones of Germany and Trieste under occupation by the United States, Great Britain, or France.

"A 'relief parcel' is defined as one originating in the United States and consigned by individual sender to an individual addressee for the personal use of himself or the members of his immediate family. The items which may be included in these relief parcels are limited to nonperishable food clothing, and clothes making materials, shoes and shoe making materials, mailable medical and health supplies and utensils if

"The combined total domestic and other edible fats, and oils included in each relief parcel must fate, and quonine hydrochloride

"When a relief parcel is present lations the words "U. S. A. Gif dorsed by the mailer on the ad dress side of the parcel and also on the Customs Declaration."
