

## Dr. B. Spilman, 79, Ridgecrest Founder, Dies

Dr. B. W. Spilman, 79, who had been ill for some time, died in a Kinston hospital last Sunday afternoon at three o'clock. Funeral services were seld on Tuesday and burial was in Kinston where he had lived for many years.

He was well known among Southern Baptists as field secretary of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, founder of Sunday School Teacher Training Courses, field secretary to schools, colleges, and universities of the Southern Baptist Convention, one of the founders of the Baptist Bible Institute now the New Orleans Baptist Seminary, and member of its board of trustees and curriculum committee.

Dr. Spilman was a graduate of Wake Forest college and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky. He was given the degree of doctor of divinity by Baylor university, Waco, Texas, and Wake Forest college.

One of his greatest achievements was the founding of the Southern Baptist - Assembly Ridgecrest and leading the institution through its early and lean years bringing it to a place of great usefulness in Southern Baptist life and work. He is called the Father of Ridgecrest Assembly.

For seven years, 1918 to 1924, he was president of the North Carolina Baptist State Conven-—Continued on Page 8
