FAVORITE DESSERTS
Pumpkin Pie
 Line two 7-inch pie pans with pastry.

Combine: 1½ cups pumpkin
 With: 2 egg yolks
 2/3 cup brown sugar
 ½ tsp. ginger
 ½ tsp. cinnamon
 1½ cups milk
 1 tsp. vanilla
 1 lemon (rind and juice)
 Add: ½ tsp. salt
 to: 2 egg whites

Whip the egg whites until stiff and fold into the combined ingredients. Fill pie shells and bake in a hot oven, 450 degrees, for 15 minutes, and in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for an additional 30 minutes.

Cranberry Pie
 Line a pie pan with crust.
 Combine: 2 tbsp. flour
 ½ tsp. salt
 2 cups sugar

Sprinkle the pie shell with two tablespoonfuls of this mixture. Cut into thirds or chop up 2 cups cranberries. Combine them with the sugar mixture and ½ cup cold water. Place berries in pie shell and dot with 2 tbsps. butter, and sprinkle them with ¼ tsp. nutmeg (optional). Cover berries with a lattice top made by cutting pie crust into half-inch strips. Bake the pie in a hot oven, 475 degrees, for 15 minutes. Reduce the heat and bake at 375 degrees for 35 minutes. This pie keeps well and may be reheated.

Pecan Pie
 Line pie pan with pastry. Beat together with rotary beater:

3 eggs
 2/3 cup sugar
 1/3 tsp. salt
 1/3 cup butter, melted
 1 cup dark corn syrup

Mix in: 1 cup pecan halves
 Pour into pastry-lined pan. Bake at 375 degrees until set and pastry is nicely browned — about 40 to 50 minutes. Cool. Serve slightly warm or cold.

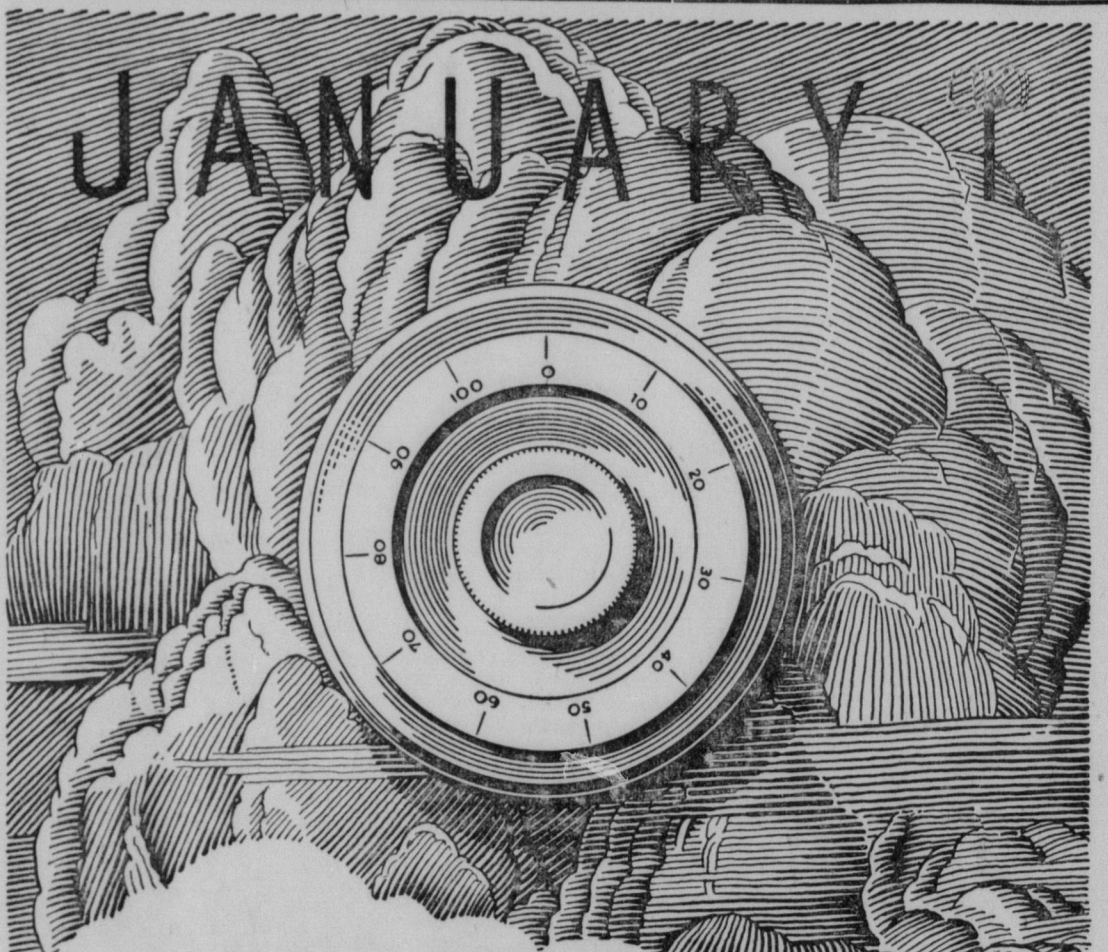
