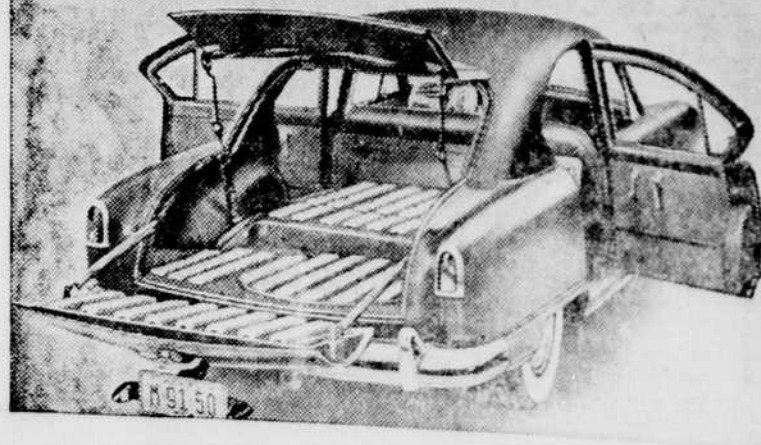
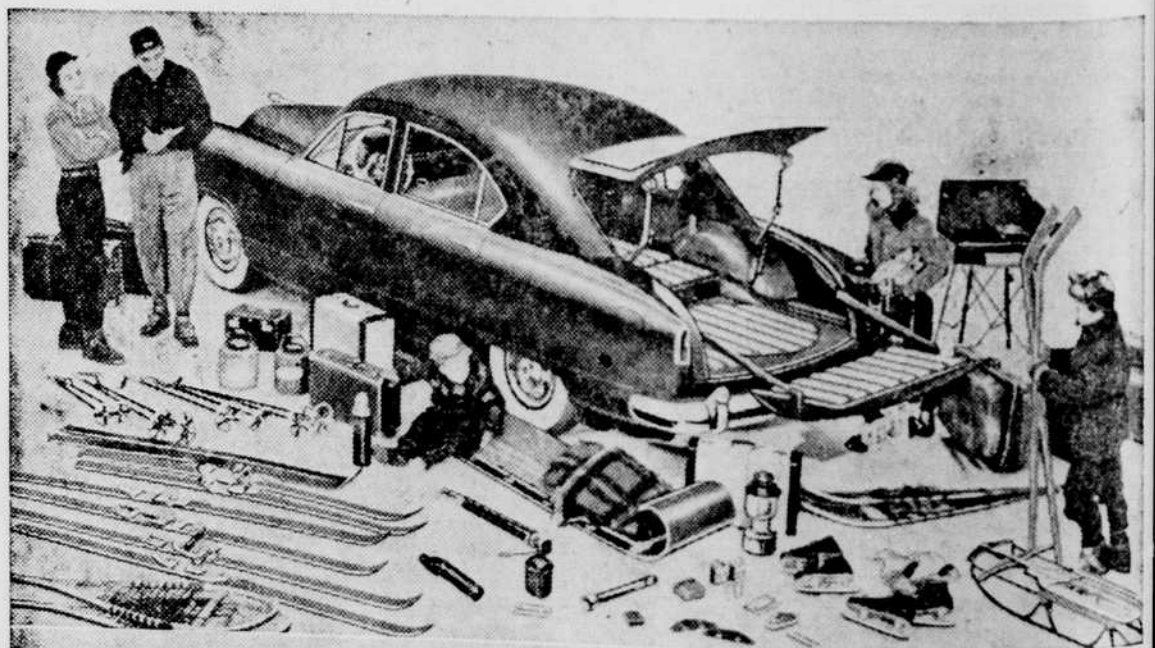
1951 GRILLE
