### AUTOMATIC DISHWASHING

Dishes and utensils should be given the same careful attention you give them when you wash dishes by hand. Hard, sticky portions of food may require special attention, such as scraping and soaking.

In arranging the dishes and pans, place them so that the best washing or spraying action will be obtained.

To do a good washing job the temperature of the water should

The Public will take notice that on the 13th day of February, 1951, at 7:30 P. M., at the Town Hall, the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Black Mountain at its regular semi-monthly meeting, will consider the adoption of an ordinance annexing to the Town of Black Mountain a territory described below;

In accordance with Chapter 729, Sessions Law 1947, the Public is further advised that the Board of Aldermen is required to submit the question of the proposed annexation to the vote of the people in the area proposed to be annexed if at its meeting on the 13th day of February, 1951 at 7:30 P. M. the Board of Aldermen receives a petition of 15% of the qualified voters, residents in the area proposed to be annexed, requesting that an election be held on the proposed extension of the Corporate Limits.

The Public is further advised that if the Board receives a petition signed by 15% of the qualified residents of the Town of Black Mountain, who actually participated in the last Gubernatorial Election, requesting that a question of the annexation be submitted to them for a vote also the Board will be required to hold an election in the municipality and in the territory to be annexed.

**BEGINNING** on a stake in the Southern margin of Fourth Street at the Northwest corner of Lot 7, Block 5 of the S. F. Dougherty Heirs Map as recorded in Plat Book 154 page 106 of the Buncombe County Records, to which reference is hereby made, it being Dr. J. H. Love's North-west corner and running thence along and with the Southern margin of said Fourth Street of the plat above mentioned, South 86 deg. East 150 feet to a stake, the Northeast corner of Lot 9 of Block 5 of the plat above mentioned; thence along and with the Easterly line of Lots 9 and 10 of Block 5 and crossing Third Street and along the Easterly line of Lot 9 of Block 6 of the plat above mentioned, South 4 deg. West 453 feet to a stake in the Northern or present line of the Town of Black Mountain Corporate Limits; thence along and with said North line, North 67 deg. 20' West 157 feet to a stake; thence North 4 deg. East 180 feet to a stake; thence along and with the Northern line of Lot 6 Block 5 of the plat above mentioned, South 86 deg. East 75 feet to a stake, the Northwest corner of Lot 8 and the Southwest corner of Lot 7 of Block 5 of the plat above mentioned; thence along and with the Western line of Lot 7 of Block 5, North 4 deg. be 150 degrees F. At lower temperatures, the washing efficiency decreases. The amount of water used will depend on the make of dishwasher used.

Sometimes dishes are stored in the dishwasher until the next meal. Many homemakers make a practice of taking the clean dishes from the dishwasher directly to the table.

The automatic dishwasher is truly time-saving. It takes only a few minutes to scrape the dishes and load the dishwasher. If yours is an average-sized family, the dishwasher need only be operated once or twice a day. Breakfast dishes may be scraped and rinsed to keep food from hardening on the surface and placed in the dishwasher. The dishes from lunch may be given a similar treatment. Then after dinner, a full load of dishes may be washed at one time.

Soaps or cleansing agents which form suds are not used in the automatic dishwasher. The use of sudsing soaps hinders rather than helps the washing action. Only non-sudsing detergents are recommended for use in the automatic dishwasher.

Detergents are mixtures of various chemical agents which combine to do a cleaning job. Many of them create very little suds or foam. They help pry the food loose from the dishes, thus making it possible for the water to wash it away. Detergents also help retard film formation, so your dishes, glassware, and silverware will be bright and sparkling clean.


