Red Cross Drive Nearing The Half-Way Mark

Reports indicate that the residential solicitation, under direction of W. Dean Willis and his staff of able assistants, is going well and is ahead of schedule in the 1951 Red Cross fund campaign. Two divisions have completed their work, Mr. Willis said. These are Miss V. E. Lively and Mrs. Bob Sawyer, division number 16, with \$27.67 amount raised, and Mrs. Frank Hudson, leader, Mrs. Cecil Nanney, Mrs. C. D. Thomas, Mrs. J. I. Cook, Jr., and Mrs. Dot McGraw, workers, division number 4, amount raised \$57.00. Grove Stone and Sand Co. and employees gave 100% in the manufacturing division. With the drive nearing the half-way mark chairmen of the various divisions are expected to intensify their efforts during the next few days to reach their goal for 1951. While quotas are higher than they were a year ago, the chairmen are confident that the contributors will recognize this fact and raise their 1951 gifts enough to more than make up the difference.

The group, chairman, amount raised to date, and quota follow: Residential, W. Dean Willis, quota - \$1200.00, cash received - \$67.99. Manufacturing, G. H. Greenwood, chairman. Quota - \$2506.25, cash received - \$118.75. Advance gifts, R. E. Finch, quota - \$1000.00. Cash received - \$55.00. Clubs and Institutions, H. B. Robinson, Quota, \$1250.00, cash received - \$176.00. Black Mountain business, John O'Connor. Quota - \$500.00. No report. Swannanoa business, James Parks, Charlie Porter. Quota - \$600.00. No report. Colored. Quota - \$100.00. No report. The major portion of funds contributed here will be used locally, was pointed out today. Of the quota of \$6875.00, only \$1938.00 will go to the National Red Cross. The remainder, or \$4939.00 will stay here to be used for local services. A break down of how the money will be spent here follows: home service, 2,025.00; disaster, 100.00; home nursing, 30.00; first aid and safety, 30.00; chapter administration, 367.00; blood program, 635.00; volunteer services, 350.00; and public information, 60.00.

TAYLOR EXPLAINS WHY HE VOTED AGAINST POWELL STREET AID BILL

Roy A. Taylor, Buncombe county representative in the general assembly, has written a letter to the Black Mountain Chamber of Commerce in which he explained his stand on the controversial Powell bill. Mr. Taylor's letter follows:

March 12, 1951
Black Mountain Chamber of Commerce
Black Mountain, N. C.
Gentlemen:

I would like to discuss with you some of the facts involved in a consideration of the Powell bill. Being interested in state aid to city streets it was at first my intention to support this bill and I so advised you. After attending a public hearing and after further study I thought it wise to reconsider.

This bill transfers the revenue from one-half cent of gasoline tax, which now amounts to about four and one-half million dollars per year, from primary construction of highways to cities and towns for street construction and repair. The need for state aid to city streets is established beyond question. There also is a great need for further development of the primary road system. Unfort-
