The state law requires that all dogs be vaccinated each year between April 1 and June 30. While inoculation will not prevent a dog already infected from developing already infected from developing the disease, it will protect a non-infected dog. Vaccination is the only form of prevention now known, and with vaccination and compliance with the quarantine now in effect in Black Mountain


