Cats may also be brought in for vaccination. **ALL DOGS MUST BE BROUGHT ON A LEASH.**

The state law requires that all dogs be vaccinated each year between April 1 and June 30. While inoculation will not prevent a dog already infected from developing the disease, it will protect a non-infected dog. Vaccination is the only form of prevention now known, and with vaccination and compliance with the quarantine now in effect in Black Mountain Township, control of the spread of this deadly disease is possible.

Persons not able to attend the April 18 clinic should take their dogs to a veterinarian for vaccination. During the month of April, all veterinarians have agreed to give the treatment at their offices at the clinic rate.
