The policies eligible for dividends are those which have been held in force for three months or longer, between the anniver-sary date of the policy in 1948 and the corresponding date in

The bulk of the accounts are being paid between three and four months following the anniversary date of the policy. If a policy has expired and has been renewed or converted within the three-year period, the veteran will receive two checks, one for the expired policy and one for the new one.


No applications are required for the dividends. The Veterans Administration has cautioned veterans not to write inquiries with reference to their dividends, since the answering of these letters will slow up the process of payments.

NSLI dividend from VA, and I'm pretty sure the amount is wrong. Where do I write to get things straightened out?

A — Write to the VA district office handling your account. Be sure to include all necessary information so that office can readily locate your file-such as full name and address, insurance number and service serial number.

Government life insurance term policies held by veterans and those in service may be renewed at the expiration of any term period for a successive period of five years without physical ex-amination, as the result of two amendments to the insurance laws signed by the President, Aug. 2, Veterans Administration announc-

Public Law 104 grants this right to holders of National Ser-vice Life Insurance and Public Law 101 contains a similar provision applicable to United States Government Life Insurance.

Formerly, renewal was authorized by the Congress for one additional five-year period at a time. The new legislation permits such renewals indefinitely.

The premium rate paid for term insurance increases each time it is renewed for a new five-year term period, in accordance with the age of the insured at the time of renewal, and becomes expensive to carry in the upper age brackets. For this reason, VA recommends early conversion to a permanent insurance, premium remains the same for the life of the contract.

The successive renewal periods granted by the Congress for term NSLI or USGLI policies apply only to those contracts for which the term period has not yet ex-

Q-Why is it that I can't get a reply to a letter I wrote Vet-erans Administration several months ago?

A-In all probability, your let-ter is one of many that does not give sufficient information to identify you. In many instances, research must be made before the writer is identified, the claim acted on, and a reply sent out. It is estimated that about 20 per cent of all letters received by VA do not give sufficient information for identification for identification.

Q-A veteran friend of mine has two discharges from service—one honorable and one under dishonorable conditions. He received the first in 1945 and the second in 1949. Would he be eligible for a

A-He would be eligible for the loan on the basis of his honorable discharge from his World War II service provided that, during that period of service, he was on active duty at least 90 days, or was discharged sooner for a service-connected disability.
