From Page 1, this Sec. One of the reasons given by the official for the high wintertime accident toll was the increased period of darkness compared to the light of summertime. To counteract the accident rate, he urged all drivers to turn on their lights with approaching darkness and slow down in keep-ing with reduced visibility. Records show that 3200 people in the United States died as a

result of traffic accidents in December last year. Of these fatalities, 600 involved pedestrians in cities and 2,000 involved drivers or other occupants of vehicles in rural accidents.
