AFTER JANUARY 31st ALL BOOKS WILL BE RETURNED TO THE COUNTY COURT HOUSE, ROOM 201 AND THE TIME FOR LISTING WILL NOT BE EXTENDED BEYOND FEBRUARY 15th. LIST WITH YOUR TOWNSHIP AND AVOID THE COURTHOUSE CROWD.
