From Page 4, this Section years—which has not yet been spent. Of course, most of this money is committed and will actually be spent in the next year or two. There was no suggestion of cutting that part of the program.

MUTUAL AID

In the mutual aid program which was under consideration, there was a difference of opinion as to whether the unspent funds appropriated previously totaled 4 billion or 6½ billion. To a lot of government spenders, a billion or two dollars is a small matter to pay any attention to.

But I felt that a billion or two dollars cut off the proposals for aid to foreign countries, if cut at the right places, would certainly be a step in the right direction.

This foreign aid program is by no means the largest spending

proposal for the coming year. In addition to this, plans are to spend about 65 other billions of dollars in the coming year. So, you see, the government spenders have rather expensive plans to continue their reckless spending policies. Of course, they are assuring you that it all is an absolute necessity—it's all in the name and the guise of "national defense."

TIME TO THINK

To be sure, we cannot let up on any worthwhile objective of real national defense. But when foreign nations have made greater progress than was originally contemplated, and when those nations are failing to contribute anything to their own defense and stability—then it seems to me that it is about time for us to apply the brakes to our give-away program.

Of course there is a lot of hysteria and fear whipped up by the bureaucrats, who prophesy doom on one hand if every one of their suggestions is not carried out, and perfect peace on the other hand if only their suggestions are followed.

As Senator Paul Douglas, a professional economist, pointed out, it will do us little good as a nation to spend untold billions for foreign aid if, in doing so, we destroy our own fundamental economy, since then we will be playing directly into the hands of Stalin. That, of course, is exactly what Stalin's regime hopes and thinks we will do.

No one can understand the true situation of appropriations unless he studies and reads the hearings and the reports of the committees, and really learns where and how our money is being spent.

Above all, nobody should accept without question the word of any bureaucrat who makes it his business to sell the public on the idea of spending more and more money.

Our baby up there now is Woodrow Jones of Rutherford. Last Saturday's voting will chop off about 30 years from the average age of our congressional delegation.

Congressman Kerr could have retired with honors. He preferred to take his chances and go down fighting. L. H. Fountain of Tarboro, 39, will be one of the country's youngest congressmen.

No Promises — The Democrats' nominee for governor has made no promises to anybody. He will go into office free-handed. Chances are that many of those on the state payroll who supported him —because it seemed the smart thing to do—will resign from their positions sometime during the winter.

In the flush of victory, Kerr Scott appointed some men to high office principally because they worked for him. Three or four of these fell by the wayside after a few months, but many of them are still on the job—and supported Umstead.

More Fun — Between now and June 28 there will still be plenty of fun for those folks who get pleasure from politics. There will be more than a score of interesting local races—or that's the way it looks from here—and the supreme court thing.

Two of the strongest legal minds to be found anywhere were running neck-an-neck. Judges R. Hunt Parker of Roanoke Rapids

and William H. Bobbitt of Charlotte can measure up well to any man now on the state supreme court. It's a pity we can't elect both of them.

Scott Appointee Itimous T. Valentine didn't run nearly as well as had been predicted. He spent a considerable amount of money in getting his name out there before the people, but some how they wouldn't take to him.

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Legal Notices

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF SWINE BY ANY PERSONS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF BLACK MOUNTAIN, BUNCOMBE COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Black Mountain:

SECTION I: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Black Mountain any swine.

SECTION II: That all persons now having swine on his or their premises within the Town of Black Mountain shall remove the same within a period of thirty (30) days from the date hereof.

SECTION III: That a violation of this ordinance by any person

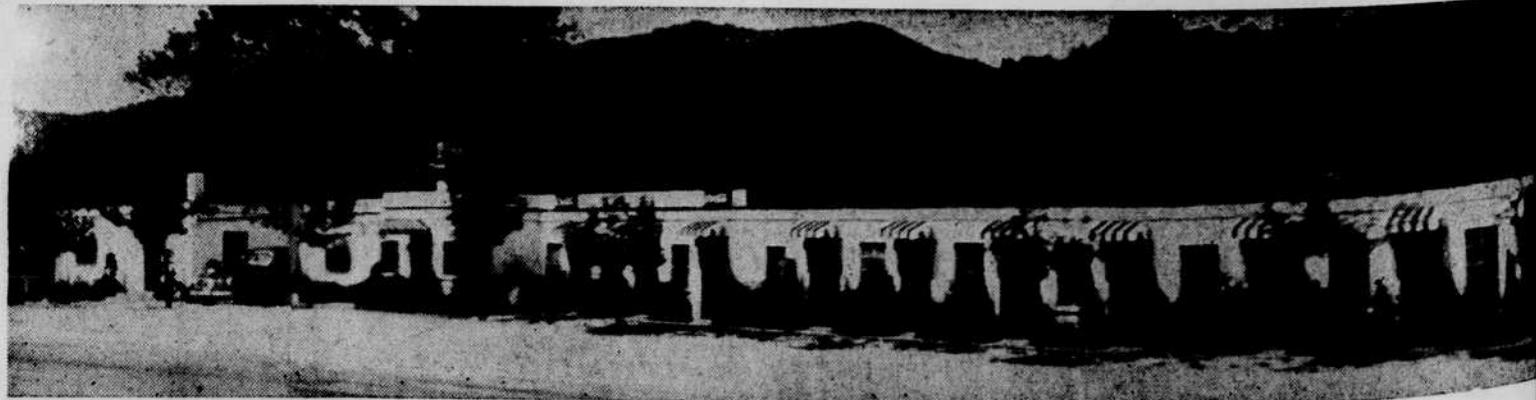
or persons, or any Section hereof, shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$50.00, or a prison term not exceeding thirty (30) days at the discretion of the Mayor of the Town of Black Mountain.

SECTION IV: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION V: That the provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after June 1st, 1952, and that the same shall be published once in the Black Mountain News.
