Summer Weather Is Invitation To **Auto Accidents**

Good summer weather and dry roads are an invitation to a pleasant afternoon outing or a week end trip-but they're also an invitation to automobile accidents.

More than three-quarters of all automobile accidents happen on dry roads in good weather, Max Woodcock, B. F. Goodrich dealer here, pointed out today. "Good driving conditions," he said, "make "Good it easy to relax behind the wheel and forget about the rest of the cars on the road. And that's when accidents happen."

He cautioned against "bleeding", or reducing air pressure of tires while motoring on long summer trips. He said that increase of a few pounds of air pressure in tires is normal on long trips and that tires are designed with this mind. "Bleeding causes a dangerous increase in the running temperature of tires and can lead to blowouts. The tire flexes more and this action causes excessive buildup of internal heat," Mr. Woodcock said.

He reminded motorists to have

their tires carefully checked for summer safety. "Hot weather is especially hard on tires. Worn tires should be replaced, injured tires repaired or replaced. A good time to rotate tires is just before a long trip. Tire rotation avoids uneven tire wear," he said.


