Two Black Mountain artists will be represented in an exhibition of paintings by professional artists and art teachers in this area.

Sponsored by the Black Mountain Arts club, Mrs. Lock has taught a class each Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings in her studio or in the open. Mrs. Lock will be represented in the coming show by five oils one still life "Communion" showing the bread and wine.

One portrait of a colored boy which gained recognition in a recent exhibition at the National Gallery in Washington, D. C.; "Sophistication", a portrait of a little local Negro girl; "Swiss Yodler", a study in light and shadows with peaks of the Alps as background.

Mrs. Grace Mertle, whose studio home is also on Blue Ridge road, will enter five oils, four landscapes. Included are a church at Burnsville, N. C., a scene near Black Mountain, and two Florida scenes; also a still life "Old Fashioned Bouquet."
