Santa Drops In On Children At Mt. Orphanage

"Operation Christmas" arrived at the Mountain Orphanage Monday morning slightly behind schedule but Santa Claus was none the less welcome.

Although the crowd of children and adults had waited for some time in the chilly weather, the appearance of the helicopter from the Pope air force base at Fort Bragg brought cheers from old and young.

Then when Santa Claus stepped out, his arms loaded with gifts, the picture was complete. The event was adequately covered by photographers from the Asheville Citizen-Times, the Black Mountain News, Life Magazine, and several private picture makers.

Piloting the plane was Lt. Len Hughes, who formerly was pilot for Admiral Joy at Panmunjon, Korea. Hughes was credited with flying 54 combat missions and bringing 97 seriously wounded infantrymen to safety with the famed Third Rescue squadron in Korea. At least three times he ventured far behind enemy lines to rescue downed Sabrejet and Thunderjet pilots.

One of the helicopters was forced down on North Fork while searching for the Orphanage field but no one was injured.

Each gift delivered to the children here had been purchased at the request of child, carefully wrapped, and tagged with the correct name.

Dolls and guns ruled the favorites. There were 436 requests for dolls and 287 for guns. Skates, cosmetics, and costume jewelry were just about tied for third place. Fifteen children indicated they wanted Bibles. The purchasing committee spent many hours selecting 1500 separate items of clothing.

"Operation Christmas" is an activity conducted each year by the Ninth Air Force at Pope air force base at Fort Bragg. Arrangements for the visit were completed by Harry Barkley, orphanage superintendent.

Buford Bridges Will Be Buried At Mooresboro

Colin Buford Bridges died of natural causes. This was the opinion expressed by Dr. P. R. Terry, Buncombe county coroner Tuesday night. An investigation has disclosed no evidence of foul play and no inquest will be held, Dr. Terry said.

The body of the 45-year-old Bridges was found on the railroad tracks about 200 yards east of Swannanoa station at 9 p. m. Monday. A cut over the left eye led investigating officers to believe that he had fallen, fatally injuring himself.

An engineer of an eastbound train saw the body and stopped his train. He notified the authorities who began an immediate investigation.

He had been employed as a weaver with the Beacon Manufacturing company at Swannanoa where he had resided for the past 14 years.

Surviving are the widow; two sons, Willie of the U. S. Navy and Kenneth of Swannanoa; four daughters, Mrs. Lloyd Phillips of Swannanoa, Misses Louise, Patsy and Brenda of the home.

Also four sisters, Miss Viola Bridges of Swannanoa, Mrs. H. C. Hall of Macon, Ga., Mrs. T. A. Morgan of Danielsville, Ga., and Mrs. S. S. Taylor of Rock Hill, S. C.

Burial will be in Mooresboro. Harrison Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.
