

The board offered 100 per cent cooperation and Mayor Kirkputrick appointed Shuford, Rayburn, and Terrell on a committee to work with R. T. Greene, town business manager, to study the situation and to report back at the next regular meeting of the board on Jan. 27. The group will confer with Judge Shelby Horton of the Domestic Relations court and get information as to what legal action can or should be taken.
