"Aunt" Daphne Inabinet, aged negresse, the oldest person in the vicinity of Springfield, S. C., died Dec. 30, of natural causes. She was buried Dec. 31, in St. Mary's church cemetery.

"Aunt" Daphne was the mother of Jim Inabinet of Black Mountain, better known as "Uncle Jim." He came to Black Mountain from South Carolina years ago with the late Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Phillips and cooked at the Monte Vista hotel for many years.
