lege under the Korean GI Bill were reminded by the Veterans Administration that the amount of money they may earn outside of school hours has no effect whatsoever on the GI allowances paid them by the Government.

The monthly allowances will remain the same, regardless of outside earnings, VA said. In fact, these earnings need not even be reported to the VA.

The only "ceiling" under the Korean GI Bill applies to veterans taking on-the-job or apprentice training. But even this "ceiling" of \$310 a month imposes no limit whatsocver upon how much a veteran may earn.

Instead it works this way: when the veteran's earnings as a trainee, plus his monthly GI allowance, exceed \$310 a month, VA scales down




