Dr. Whims Will Discuss Polio Vaccination
 The Grammar School PTA will meet tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p. m. in the school auditorium. Mrs. Billie Burgess' room will be in charge of the devotional. Business will include the nomination and election of officers for the coming year.
 The speaker for the evening will be Dr. H. C. Whims, Buncombe county health officer. His subject will be the Salk vaccine against polio, which will be used in nationwide tests for the first time this year.
 Black Mountain was one of the schools selected to participate in this new anti-polio program. Although the State Board of Health has decided against the use of the vaccine in North Carolina this year, due to delays in receiving the vaccine until the beginning of the polio season, every parent is interested in any new weapon to be used in the fight against polio. Dr. Whims is a qualified speaker, having been in charge of the polio hospital at Hickory in the epidemic of the '40's.

When the Swannanoa P.T.A. presents the Grass Roots Opera production of Carmen at the school auditorium, April 23, William Allen, lyric tenor of Raleigh will be heard in the role of Remendado.
