Head Gives Tips For Motorists
 Driving tips for vacation drivers is expertly handled in the North Carolina Motor carriers courtesy and safety program for August with special emphasis on making a series of stops should be planned to see the points of interest and to allow time for a good night's sleep. The official stressed today that the program is designed to help motorists plan for safer trips and to return rested and relaxed.
 The final vacation tip suggested by Mr. Beam concerns the varying traffic laws in different localities. He pointed out that all states have laws dealing with local situations and being a tourist does not exempt one from the necessity of knowing the laws in different states.
 —American veterinarians now have an effective new vaccine for combating blue-tongue, a disease principally of sheep.
 —The United States 1954 wheat crop, now estimated at 1 billion bushels, is in excess of prospective domestic use and probable exports during the next year.
 —North Carolina's 1954 peach crop is now forecast at 960,000 bushels, 90,000 bushels less than the June 1 estimate.
