NOTICE AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF WATER DURING THE PRESENT EMERGENCY: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAY-OR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BLACK OF THE TOWN OF BLACK MOUNTAIN:

ORDINANCE NO. 260-

IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF BLACK MOUNTAIN: SECTION 1: That an emergency is hereby declared due to the shortage of water in the Town's reservoir, said supply being only

thirty days supply, and, SECTION 2: That all users of water connected to the Town of Black Mountain's water system are hereby notified that the above coid emergency exists and that are hereby notified that the above said emergency exists and that they are hereby ordered to use water for essential purposes only: that until properly notified it is un-lawful to use water for washing cars, watering lawns or shubbery or any other unnecessary use. SECTION 3: That a violation of

this Ordinance by any user of water shall be deemed a misde-meanor and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding \$50.00 or imprisoned not exceeding 30 days. SECTION 4: That this ordinance is deemed an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect upon its ratification by the Board of Aldermen of the Town
