WISDOM FOR DAILY LIVING

Lesson Material: Prov. 3:1-6; 4:10-15; 18, 19.

Memory Verse: Prov. 3:5-6 "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and lean not into thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him and he shall direct thy paths."

A good memory holds an important place in the life of obedience. To forget the law is to neglect and transgress it. The son who forgets his father's rules, also neglects and disobeys them.

Therefore, interest in God's prescribed duties will cause the Christian to remember those duties. This, beloved, is greatly needed these days. There are great numbers of professed people of God who seem to take very little interest in what God has revealed in His Word concerning Christian Living. They apparently do as they please. Oh, that they would take an interest and remember! Let us carefully note, however, that in the present dispensation of grace, things are entirely different.

At this time eternal life is the gift of God, through Jesus Christ the Lord, received by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. John 3:14-16. Length of days are not now assured for Godly living, and many of the Lord's true and devoted people, for one reason or another, depart this life quite early. This is not to say that devotion to Jesus Christ and Godly living are not owned and blessed of the Lord; for they are in many ways. In many instances, also, devotion to Jesus Christ and Godly living contribute to physical health and longer living. But these things are not promised and assured as special blessing for obedience in the present dispensation.

During the present dispensation the believer on the Lord Jesus Christ is freely justified by grace, and being justified, he has peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom. 3:24; 5:1; Eph. 2:14). Nothing can be more blessed and wonderful than a heart and mind at rest amid the raging storms of life, being guarded by the peace of God.

Verses 3-4. Holding to Mercy and Truth.

Mercy and truth are twins of grace; they live and thrive together.

Solomon would have his son remember that adhering to and practicing mercy and truth would bring him the respect of God and man, and would demonstrate the fact that he was truly wise. This reminds us of the fact that true piety or Godliness is noticed by God and men. Concerning the Child Jesus Christ we read that He "increased in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and men." (Luke 2:52). We note, however, that in after years Jesus found little favor with the Jewish rulers. They hated Him with a bitter hatred, and again and again sought to take His life. But He found favor with those whose favor was worth having. We find similar sentiment concerning the early Christians (Acts 2:47). They had "favor with all the people."

Verses 5-6. Putting our trust in God.

"In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths." It is not "He may direct thy paths," but "He will" do so. Where God is acknowledged in all the affairs of life, there Divine guidance is certain, sure and safe.

Verses 4:10-15. Again it is important to remember our parental instructions, when we are standing in the face of wickedness and are tempted to be lured into its snares. We should remember that we have been warned before to turn from them.

Verses 18-19. The way of the just, which is here described is entirely different from the way of the evil men. Because they walk in darkness, the wicked walk in constant danger; they stumble. "They do not know wickedness as wickedness, nor do they apprehend the destruction which it involves." (Pul. Com.) The wicked walk in darkness and therefore they know not from whence the temptation to evil, the nature of their evil deeds, nor the misery and destruction which lies before them. (I Sam. 2:9; Job 18:5, 6, 18; 24:17-18; Is. 59:10; John 3:19; 11:10; 12:35, 36.)

Team Work of Old Fort Community Wins High Praise

The Old Fort Community Council sponsored and financed the office of Dr. Jerald M. Snyder, Philadelphia dentist, and completed one of the finest jobs of getting their men to Old Fort to practice that has ever been known in any mountain community.

This project, participated in by the organizations and businesses of Old Fort, brought the young dentist from the Pennsylvania city in January, 1954. He is active in all community affairs and has been elected as secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Snyder was graduated from the University School of Dentistry in 1948. He did post graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania and Temple University. The young man was an instructor in Oral Surgery at the University of Pennsylvania. He was a dental officer in the United States Navy during World War II. He was a lieutenant (JG) and served at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina for two years.

Not one but practically every business and club in Old Fort helped in bringing the dentist to Old Fort. They raised \$1,593.04.
