


The Registration Book shall remain open at the City Hall from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. for seven (7) days beginning April 16th, 1955 to April 23rd, 1955 (excluding Sunday, April 17th, 1955) with the exception of Saturday, April 16th, 1955 when they shall close at 9:00 P.M.

All qualified voters are also hereby notified that they shall be ineligible to vote in the Town election to be held on May 3rd, 1955 unless registered on above dates.

The reason for the calling of the new registration is that none has been held since 1917 and the old registration is dilapidated and in places the names are unintelligible.

All persons who have been residents of the State of North Carolina for at least one year and the Town of Black Mountain thirty days. who are over 21 years old and can read and write, will be eligible to register and vote.
