And so, even though the Raleigh Times will not be so laboriously Democratic as its big brother, the Raleigh News and Observer, it will certainly be no Knight in armor for the GOP.

They are putting up a big, handsome building here to house the two papers. In fact, this was started months before announcement of purchase of the Times was made.

When it was announced here that the N&O had indeed bought the Times, there was growling and gnashing of teeth on the part of the more conservative elements of the Democratic Party.

"How could this possibly be," someone asked, "with the News and Observer owning the Times?" The answer is that the N&O has had one or two now—who sometimes disagree violently with the way they were written.
