Miss Janie Brown of Arlington, Va., is visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Brown at "Wile-neuk."

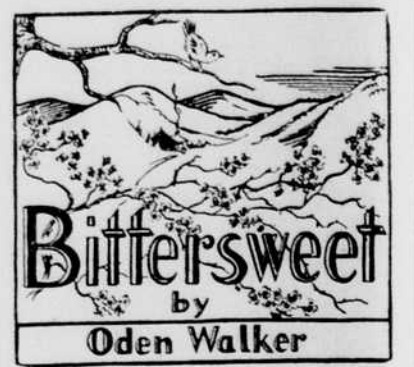
