 successful in other towns in this area. They will be set up to charge 10 cents per hour for the rush season and 5 cents per hour for the winter months. Patrons may use pennies, nickels, or dimes. They will register six minutes for a penny and a half hour for a nickel during the summer. During the winter motorists will receive 12 minutes for a penny. The meters will come with equipment which can be changed as the cost varies.
 One important feature will be that violators may pay their fines by means of a ticket-envelope which policemen will leave under their windshields. A depository for tickets will be placed on every eighth or ninth meter.
 Cost of the meters to the town will be paid for out of revenue. The meter company will take 50 per cent of the revenue until the machines are paid for. They will cost \$67.25 each.
 "We are not installing meters in order to raise revenue for the town but to control traffic in the congested areas on Broadway and Sutton avenue," Mayor Whitaker said. "The meters will help by making it unnecessary for two policemen to spend most of their time on Broadway."

Red Cross Aids 38,000 N. C. GIs

In North Carolina last year the Red Cross assisted more than 38,000 servicemen's and war veterans' families with their welfare problems, spent \$463,000 in behalf of 3,200 disaster-stricken families, and trained thousands of persons in safety skills and home care of the sick. These were highlights of a report of 1955 accomplishments received today by Otty E. Leeman, chairman of the Black Mountain-Swannanoa chapter. This report was prepared for Governor Hodges by K. C. Lattimer of Southeastern Area headquarters in Atlanta, who is director for field services in North Carolina. Disaster operations were necessary in 22 counties, mostly for victims of hurricanes Connie, Diane and Ione in Coastal Carolina. Lattimer's report stated. Most of the \$463,000 granted to these victims was for homes reconstruction and refurbishing and for extended family maintenance until homes could again be made habitable. Funds granted were an outright gift, according to the report.

PARKWAY WILL OPEN FOR TRAFFIC ON APRIL 15
 April 15 is the date for the opening of the Blue Ridge Parkway between Oteen and Mt. Mitchell. The Wagon Road Gap section will also open on April 15. The Parkway has been closed for the winter. B. Stricklin, states that the Park Service rangers are preparing for the largest season the highway has ever had. Last year over 4,500,000 visitors drove over the Parkway, which links Shenandoah National Park and Asheville.
