WASHINGTON.—The 84th Congress will soon be history. By July 12, there had been 18-146 measures introduced in the 84th Congress. Obviously, all of these measures will not be legislative action. This is not a bad thing, because there are many measures that do not merit the time and attention of Congress. When the Congress adjourns, all legislation not enacted will die on the statute books. It is true, of course, that many desirable bills languish in committee or fail to get consideration in the final hectic days. The legislative log-jam is now at its worst. Advocates of legislation are pressing for action. The Administration is concerned with its program in the Congress.
