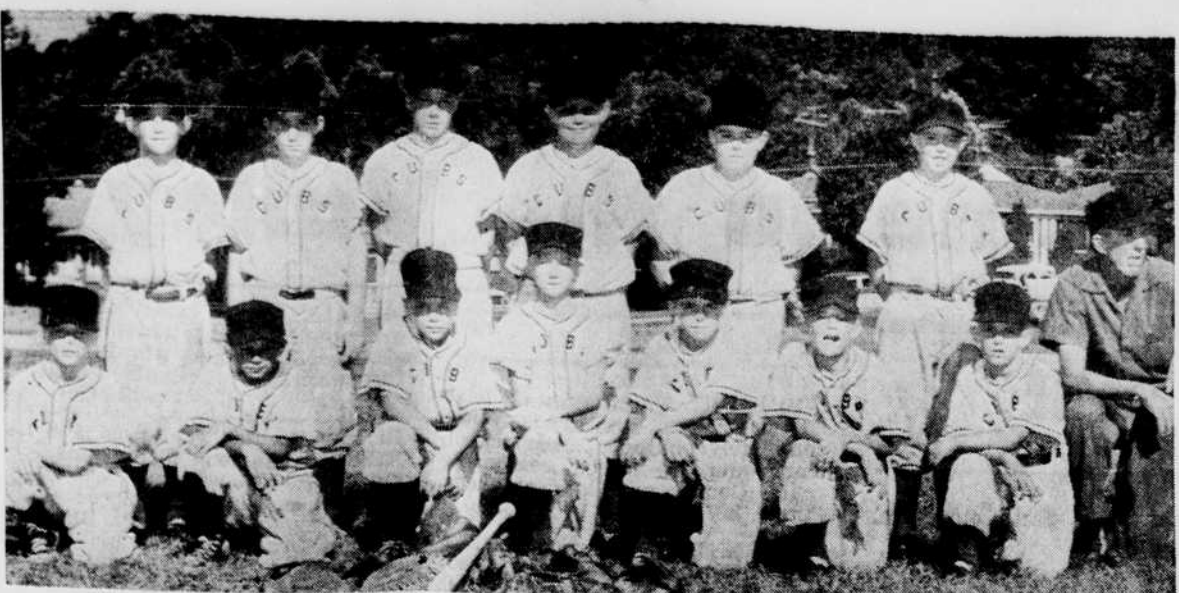


"THE COMMUNITY MEETING PLACE"
