**A SQUEEZE O' LEMON—FOR FLAVOR**

A little lemon juice accents flavor, and more adds a delightfully new taste. It's a common seasoning—very popular too. Lemon is used in cooking frequently by Europeans, and by Americans who go a bit further than everyday cooking to give a gourmet touch to their meals. Numerous foods are enhanced by lemon, that tart, refreshing flavor of a year-round California fruit: soups and juices, meat and fish, fruits and vegetables, sauces and dressings, and many beverages.

**Soups and Juices**—Add a bit of lemon juice and chopped parsley to canned soup for a pepper-upper, and turn a simple can-opened dish into a treat. Or serve a lemon wedge with chilled soup, and let each person squeeze his own. Top cold consommé with lemon slices, and for that added touch, float notched lemon slices in any soup.

**Fish and Meat**—To bring out a delicate flavor, sprinkle lamb or fish with lemon juice a few minutes before cooking—cuts down odors, adds to the flavor and tenderizes the meat. Use the same trick on chicken or turkey—rub the poultry inside and out with a cut lemon for white, juicy and tender meat. Now, for added zest, try a big squeeze of lemon juice over fried or broiled liver, steaks or chops, the old-fashioned fried

Fruit juices and pulp for use in making jams and jellies during less busy periods.

Citrus fruit juice frozen during peak season for later use.

**Meats.**

Leftover or odd pieces of meat, cut up and frozen for use in a meat pie, salad or goulash.

Slices of roast beef, chicken or lamb frozen in its own gravy for hot sandwiches.

Meat loaf baked and frozen.

Chicken pies baked and frozen for future use.

**Salads and Desserts.**

Parfait glasses filled, ready for serving, thus avoiding a last-minute rush.

Fruit salads with a cream cheese or gelatin base.

Vegetables—Mushrooms—sautéed and frozen for use in casseroles.

Potatoes—French-fried and frozen for use in casseroles.
